MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Two Campuses, One University

At the end of May, I received notification from the New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE) that it had accepted the Interim (Fifth-Year) Report that the University had submitted as part of its accreditation requirements. Like all NECHE-accredited colleges and universities, Hellenic American University conducts an extensive self-study halfway through the 10-year accreditation period on its compliance with the Commission's nine standards of accreditation and submits a detailed report of its findings.

In its letter the Commission commended Hellenic American University for "the ways in which [it] has addressed its challenges and significantly strengthened the University over the last five years. "One area of note was the University's success in increasing enrollment at the Nashua campus and the "robust learning experience" this has fostered, and our progress in expanding academic and student support services. We are continuing our efforts in both areas, and I am reasonably confident that we will be welcoming a record number of new students in Nashua this Fall.

Re-reading the Commission's letter and reflecting on our commitment to further integrating the two campuses, I thought I would focus this letter on recent developments at Nashua.

Among the most important steps we have taken to bring the two communities closer together is ensuring frequent and systematic communication between Athens and Nashua faculty and greater interaction between students on both sides of the Atlantic. Faculty, for example, from both campuses regularly participate in the bodies of university governance. Likewise, all instructors benefit from the same program of new training seminars that the Dean for Digital Learning and Innovation delivers onsite in Athens and in Nashua. Instructors from both campuses took part in the May 22nd workshop on strategic planning for Diversity, Equity,

Alumni Success stories



Christian Moraitis (BSI '23)

Even as a high school student, Christian Moraitis (BSI '23) knew what he wanted to study and where. "As a kid I was always opening up my toys to see how they worked," he says. "And then in high school, playing video games, I would wind up thinking, how did they put this together? I think that really sparked my interest in IT and especially development."

The "where" was a college or university in the US—Christian's mother is from New Jersey. But that wasn't possible financially. His next steps, he said, was to look at American university programs in Greece. "Hellenic American University seemed to be a good fit for what I wanted to do. And it has been. I fully enjoyed being a student here."

Christian graduated this June. He managed not only to finish his B.S. in Informatics in just under four years, but to do so while working a series of jobs, including a stint as factory worker and a position managing a surfing and watersport center in Rhodes and later as a software engineer for Infralabs Ltd. Towards the end of his studies he was working in the Netherlands as a Full Stack developer for a firm called Pluxbox, where he created software tools for the company's platform.

While a student in the B.S. in Informatics program, Christian won the "Best Paper Award" for the research he conducted for his capstone project and which he

presented at the Hellenic American University Student Research Conference on May 13, 2023. The project involved developing a tool that could eventually enable deaf and hard-of-hearing persons to use their native language to communicate online with English-language speakers who do not know ASL.

In his research, Christian used machine learning and AI-enabled object detection to create a tool that would read hand gestures in real-time, predict the corresponding American Sign Language (ASL) signs, and then compile them into a sentence. The translated caption text could then be converted into speech.

Given the constraints of time and resources, he focused on having the object detection algorithm predict the letters of the American Sign Language (ASL) alphabet. The algorithm was trained on a dataset of over 3,000 photos of signed (gestured) letters that he created himself.

The idea for the project came to Christian during the COVID lockdown and the boom in videoconferencing and virtual meetings collaboration that the containment measures triggered. Christian says that while the digital platforms provided a way to keep collaborating and communicating during the quarantine for many, that was less true for deaf and hard-of-hearing persons.

Even though the project was a prototype that detected and identified letters as they were being signed, the technology, given sufficient resources, could eventually be scaled to identify and predict signs as well. Still, Christian found the project very satisfying. He says that the capstone was an ideal opportunity to pursue an idea that had been on his mind since the lockdown. "I wanted to use it to do something I couldn't otherwise do and at the same time to learn new things and to make something of value."

Christian tells us he has just accepted a new position, again as a Full Stack software engineer, this time at Secura, a multinational cyber security company based in the Netherlands. He will be developing security-related software products to help customers gain insight in their digital security.

The capstone project he did at Hellenic American University, however, left its trace in his plans for the near future. He hopes to pursue graduate studies in machine learning and computer vision.

Panagiot (Pete) Tsolis

Academic Director of Business Programs
Associate Professor



Panagiot (Pete) Tsolis joined Hellenic American University in 2021 as an instructor in the business program after two decades of international corporate experience. Now an assistant professor, he is reshaping the University's business programs as Director of the Business Programs.

His strategic vision draws on the strength of the faculty and their real-world experience; among his immediate priorities has been to expand the program's team of faculty members to include new hires who are stellar practitioners in their fields and translate that experience in the classroom.

As part of his responsibilities as Director of Business Programs, Pete has been working to develop outreach activities for the University's B-Cube initiative. Launched in November 2021, B-Cube is an initiative developed by Hellenic American University and Envolv Entrepreneurship that offers physical, networking, and mentoring resources for

innovation and entrepreneurship. In addition to providing open co-working space, B-Cube organizes talks by business experts, competitions, and workshops on design thinking, entrepreneurial venturing, and other topics of interest to innovators and promising entrepreneurs. Pete himself co-lead one of B-Cube's workshop this March with George Stroumboulis, CEO of IDEOLI Group on how technology and the post-covid new normal have changed the global perspective in the business world and how managers can lead teams of diverse backgrounds in this new environment.

Pete has also made progress on another priority: improving the effectiveness of mentoring for business undergraduates. He's developed a spreadsheet-based model that helps mentors keep track of their students' progress and what courses they still need to complete and when. The application helps ensure that students complete their degree requirements on schedule and frees mentors up to spend more time on other areas of mentoring, such as help on career planning.

Pete comes to the university with an impressive track record in senior management positions in the hospitality, tourism, casino gaming, and tech sectors. While at MGM Resorts International, Pete led efforts to consolidate the

marketing activities of the group's individual properties into a coherent centralized corporate strategy. He also worked for Cosmopolitan of Las Vegas, where he handled corporate partnerships and VIP customers as a member of the opening management team that was set up after Deutsche Bank acquired the partially completed property and decided to convert the planned condominium tower into an integrated resort casino valued at \$4 billion.

Pete's corporate experience also includes start-ups. At VizExplorer, he was responsible for providing case studies to the development team and building a business services department, along with the consulting work he did for clients from North Africa, Europe, North America, Latina America, and Asia.

Born in Long Beach California, Pete moved with his family to Las Vegas, Nevada, where he continued his studies, earning a BSBA in Marketing and an Executive MBA from the University of Nevada Las Vegas. He is currently a PhD candidate with Pepperdine University in Global Leadership and Change, with a dissertation on sustainable tourism development in Greece. Not surprising, perhaps, when you consider that traveling is how he likes to spend his free time. Pete has already traveled to most of the states in the US (30 so far) and has spent extended periods of time in Greece and Mexico.

Hellenic American University's 13th Commencement Celebrates Class of 2023

Athens, June 29, 2023 - Hellenic American University celebrated its 13th commencement ceremony at the Athens Concert Hall (Dimitris Mitropoulos Hall). The event brought together the graduates and their teachers, friends, and family, as well as esteemed guests, University officers and trustees to honor the 74 graduates of the Class of 2023.


The ceremony opened with valedictory addresses delivered by Angeliki Georgaki (M.A. in Applied Linguistics-TESOL) and Sofia Votsiou (B.S. in Psychology). The Class of 2023 salutatorians, Jeffrey Scott Basile (MBA) and Despoina Simitsoglou (B.S. in Psychology), were also recognized for their outstanding achievements.

Continuing its tradition, Hellenic American University awarded honorary degrees to individuals who have distinguished themselves through achievements in the arts or sciences, education, public service, or philanthropy. This year the University awarded two honorary doctorates: one to Eleftherios Skiadas, a journalist and historian with a long record of public service, including his current tenure as vice mayor and President of the Cultural Foundation of the City of Athens; the other to Dr. Eric Smaw, a philosopher, educator, and civil rights advocate who serves on the national board of the American Civil Liberties Union. Dr. Smaw is Professor and Department Chair of Philosophy at Rollins College, where he also serves as Special Assistant to the Provost for Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging.

During his commencement address, President Leonidas Phoebus Koskos pointed out that the new graduates were entering their professional life in a world that is rapidly being changed by the astonishing advances in artificial intelligence and new work environments. He encouraged them to draw upon the critical thinking and innovative mindset their education has equipped them with to meet the challenges in a creative and productive way and called upon them to embrace their role as global citizens and contribute to the development of their communities.

The ceremony was followed by a reception where graduates had the opportunity to celebrate this significant milestone with their professors, loved ones, and friends.

Students from both campuses came together, some virtually, at the Annual Town Meeting in February 2023 to discuss the findings of the recent course evaluation and student satisfaction surveys. We expect, too, the two Student Councils to be working more closely together in the new academic year.

Regardless of where you did your studies, you are all alumni of the same university. The success of our Nashua alumni enhances the value of the degrees earned by those who studied in Athens, and vice-versa. The University's 13th Commencement in June illustrates this notion of diversity in unity. The valedictorians and salutatorians of the Class of 2023 included a MAAL-TESOL graduate (Angeliki Georgaki) who, like her fellow students in the program, did her degree entirely online; a Nashua MBA graduate (Jeffrey Scott Basile), and two Athens-based alumnae of the University's B.S. in Psychology program (Sofia Votsiou and Despoina Simitsoglou).

Apropos alumni success, I would like to thank all of you who participated in the recent Alumni Employment Survey. We now have reliable information on the employment status of 3 out of every 4 graduates. Of these alumni, 94% are employed or self-employed. We know, too, that 85% of our M.S. in Informatics graduates are working in a field related to their degree or pursuing doctoral studies in the field. A similar percentage of alumni/ae from the M.A. in Applied Linguistics—TESOL are working in a degree-related field. In addition, a recent review of the M.S. in Sales Management program found that after starting the MSSM program 70% of current students and graduates received a promotion from their firm or switched employers for a better position.

The valuable information you provide on your employment status enables us to better assess the educational effectiveness of our academic programs. Just as importantly, the more we know about what our graduates are doing professionally, the more we can do to strengthen our alumni network.

Dr. Alexander Nikolaou, adjunct faculty member in the B.A. in English Language and Literature, M.A. in Applied Linguistics, and Ph. D. in Language and Communication programs, co-delivered a presentation at the annual conference of the American Association for Applied Linguistics, which was held in Portland, Oregon March 18-21, 2023. The presentation, titled "Critical Reflections on Qualitative Research Methods in the Study of Affect in Heritage Language Maintenance", was co-presented by Dr. Jennifer Sclafani, a faculty member at the University of Massachusetts, Boston, and Ms. Rosiane Barcelos de Oliveira, a doctoral candidate at the same institution. During their talk, Dr. Nikolaou and his colleagues presented insights gained from two ethnographic research studies with heritage language (HL) speakers, one a case study of language socialization in a Brazilian trilingual family, the other interviews with successful adult HL speakers of Modern Greek.

On March 22-24, 2023, **Dr. Ermioni (Monica) Karachaliou**, Director of Student Affairs & International Programs, joined colleagues and experts in the field of study abroad for a three-day meeting of the Conference Committee which is planning the 19th Annual Forum on Education Abroad Conference in Seattle, U.S..



Dr. Sofia Kontossi, adjunct faculty member in the Bachelor of Music program, musicologist, and pianist, was invited as a guest artist for a masterclass series at George Enescu National University of Arts in Iași, Romania, in May, through the Erasmus University program. 
Panagiotis Koukounas (MAT ’18), who has been working as a freelance translator and oral examiner in English examinations, discovered


Saman Ahmadi Goli (MBA ’22) has relocated to Tennessee, USA and has been working on the production line at Great
