2016 Commencement



On June 30th, Hellenic American University celebrated its 8th Commencement. Honored guests, family and friends, faculty and administration celebrated the accomplishments of our graduating class and wished them success in the new journey ahead. We gathered at the Theater of the American Community Schools to join in celebrating our graduating class and their families as they marked the beginning of a new chapter in their lives. Alumni Success Story: The 2013 BM Alumni

The Music Department's graduating class of 2013—William Antoniou, Stathis Kampylis, Konstantina Polichronopoulou and Andreas Tselikas—returned to the College this May for an unusual homecoming. The occasion was the "Hellenic American University Young Creators" concert, which featured works written by the four alumni, as well as pieces written by two current students in the composition strand of the Bachelor of Music program, Manos Markantonis and Charalampos Risvas.

All four alumni recall the encouragement, support and guidance they received from their faculty. Konstantina remembers how while a student, her mentor Ioannis Tselikas had recommended her to transcribe Stravinsky's "Suite de Pulcinella" for the Kyklos Ensemble, which was performed at Athens Megaron Concert Hall. A pianist and composer who collaborates frequently with choreographers and visual artists, Kontantina is also an engaged educator. After graduating from the University, she earned a Master's degree in music education from the University of Nicosia and now teaches piano at the Nakas Conservatory. In March of this year her piece "Nostalgia" was performed by L'Anima String Quartet and Electronics at the Music in Motion Festival.

Stathis, too, noted the opportunities he had as a young composer to have his work performed, both at the HAU and at the Athens' Concert Hall. For the young composer, his undergraduate degree in Music gave him the foundations to pursue advanced studies in composition. He's currently doing his PhD in electroacoustic

composition in the Music Department of the University of Bristol. His investigations focus on creating electroacoustic works which make use of a brain-computer music interface as a random generator.

Speaking of journey, William, who is officially the first University's first composition student, also talked about the connections he had found between student life at HAU and his professional career: "It's the process itself. Most of the work I did as a student at HAU was performed in one way or another either at the HAU Theater or elsewhere. In my opinion this is the best way to 'study' because while you may still be a student, your work is heard and critiqued by actual audiences, as opposed to just your professors."

He's now working on several film and theater projects in New York, London and Greece, including the music for Rachael Hunt's *Poker Face* and *Tingle*, directed by Mia Moldovan. His music for *Lucy*, a Greek production directed by Stamatis Giannoulis, won him the award for Best Original Score at the Los Angeles Shorts Film Festival. Hopefully, at some point in the future we here in Athens will get to see his new opera (working title: *The Turing Opera*), which he's now finishing and which will be getting its first major reading in New York this October.

Opera is on Andreas' creative horizon right now as well. He's currently working on a new opera project for the City of Athens Symphony Orchestra, where he serves as conductor in residence. The project is Giuseppe Verdi *Ernani*, which will open the new season on September 18th and which has not been played in Greece for the last fifty years. Future engagements include symphonic concerts with major Greek symphony orchestras and opera projects with companies abroad.

Andreas also found a close connection between study-life and real-life. "HAU offered such a significant study program," he says, "that working in real-life felt like a familiar procedure that has been accomplished with success previously."

This reunion was a moving moment for the alumni. Although their music has been performed at numerous venues in Greece and abroad, they say it was an honor to have their work performed at the College. As Andreas says, "I feel very touched that I have already 3 premieres of my music performed at HAU. I feel as if I'm at home and can express my deepest thoughts and ideas freely."

It is a feeling William echoes. "I was allowed to do my thing," he says. "I wasn't forced to work within any parameters. I was given full freedom as to the type of pieces I wanted to present, the styles, and instruments."

The Hellenic American University Young Creators concert was held on May 17, 2016, and was organized in cooperation with the Greek Composers' Union.

Faculty Spotlight

Dr. Evangelia Siachou





It's been an eventful academic year for Dr. Evangelia Siachou, Assistant Professor in Hellenic American University's Business

programs—on all fronts: research, teaching and administration.

One important highlight, for her and for the University alike, was the receipt of a prestigious Emerald Award for outstanding contribution to scholarly research. She received the award for a paper she had coauthored on the role of employee ignorance in knowledge sharing, which was published last year in the Journal of Knowledge Management.

The paper, which was entitled "Individual variables with an impact on knowledge sharing: The critical role of employees' ignorance" was selected by the journal's editorial team as a Highly Commended Paper in the 2016 Emerald Literati Network Awards for Excellence. We asked Dr. Siachou—or Lia as she's known among her colleagues—to tell us a bit more about her study.

"There's been a great deal of work about how companies can manage the knowledge they possess or acquire," she says. "But we don't talk about how they manage ignorance. We tend to forget that employees often don't know what knowledge is available, who has it, or where it is. This ignorance has a cost, of course: it means you'll look outside the organization for knowledge that may already exist within the company. Our paper proposed a way to classify various kinds of ignorance and explore the managerial implications of each."

In summer 2015, Lia was also appointed Director of the University's General Education program. One of the first changes she spearheaded was the addition of a course in IdeationžFZWłagdeW; WWY a' i ZWŁYW Sescheba' eW

to increasing interest among the University's students—regardless of their major—in starting their own business; a reflection of a trend that has been seen in Greece and the broader EU labor market. The course, which is cotaught by faculty from the Business, English and Music programs, is also much in keeping with the University's mission-driven commitment to interdisciplinary education.

But Lia sees an even broader audience for the course beyond those who are contemplating a start-up of their own. "One of the main outcomes of the course is to encourage a habit of openmindedness while exploring sources of possible inspiration," she says.

The three modules of the course follow closely the process of ideation itself: idea generation, assessment, and prototyping. Students come up with ideas for a start-up and then work to develop it as a business model. The Music and English faculty get involved in the first part, as students explore innovation in the arts and the creative process of writing music and text, and a dance instructor leads a workshop on movement to help students develop a better stage presence when pitching their ideas.

The workshop for putting together the business development canvas is led by Benno Groosman, Founding Director of an architectural/ engineering firm and residential entrepreneur at Orange Grove, a business incubator and innovative workspace for young entrepreneurs that was started by the Dutch embassy along with Greek and Dutch corporate sponsors and NGOs. One unanticipated positive outcome of the collaboration was that Orange Grove offered one of the students (and an alumna) an internship, following an interview with Groosman.

This summer Hellenic American University welcomed its first group of high-school students in its new Summer Academies program at the Athens campus. The students took part in an Aviation and Flight Academy.

For most teenagers summer vacation is first of all a chance to unwind after a stressful academic year and to catch up on missed sleep. But after the first few weeks of endless hours spent playing video games and hanging out with friends on the beach (or on Facebook and Instagram), at least some teenagers are eager to find an engaging and creative activity to

fill the long stretch of unstructured time.

The Summer Academies do just that, giving motivated high-school students (14-16 years old) the chance to explore new fields of interest and make new friends— and earn college credits at the same time.

Science, Technology, Enginee

The program is the brainchild of Hellenic American University Provost, Dr. Triant Flouris. As he notes, the Summer Academies came out of the University's commitment to creating learning opportunities at Hellenic American College for high-school—and

eventually primary school students. "They're an excellent way to smooth the transition from high school to college studies, wherever the student decides to go," he says.

The Academies also reflect the Provost's own interest in action research and STEM education [Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics]: "I think courses like the ones offered in the Summer Academies program can have very positive outcomes for young students when they're done right—with a good balance of theory and practice, as it's done in the US."

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The Aviation and Flight Academy was developed in partnership with Athens International Airport.

Provost's Update on Accreditation

In previous updates for our Alumni Newsletter, I have focused on the value of accreditation and our status as a United States university accredited by NEASC. However, equally important in the life of the University is its compliance with the standards of its regulatory body, by whose authority it is entitled to grant degrees. In fact, in order to earn accreditation, a university must be in good standing with its regulators. In the case of Hellenic American University, this is the Higher Education Commission of the Division of Higher Education of the New Hampshire Department of Education. The Commission regulates colleges and universities such as ours that have a physical presence in the State. As part of this oversight, the University periodically reports on regulatory matters and is visited by a team from the Commission that verifies our compliance with relevant standards and laws. The next visit is scheduled for October 2-4, 2016. The university's faculty and administration have been diligently working to finalize the reports needed for the visit. We are ahead of schedule and hopeful that we will meet this milestone with success. I will keep you updated on our status.

2016 Alumni Employment Survey

Alumni employability is a key measure of student success and has always been a priority for the University. It's even enshrined in its mission to educate its students "to contribute to the economic and social development of their communities." Earlier alumni may remember the first extensive survey of alumni employment, conducted 4 years ago. This spring, the Director of the Career Development Office conducted a telephone survey of all alumni. The idea was not only to gather data on the employment status of alumni but also to provide information on the Office's services.

Before this June's commencement, the University has graduated about 400 alumni. We managed to reach about half of you by phone. Program coordinators and faculty were able to provide employment information for another 10% of alumni. It's encouraging to find out that the overwhelming majority of all respondents are employed.

Although the survey did not specifically ask respondents about the relevance of their job to their studies (the next survey will), it appears that for most degree programs, the great majority of alumni/ae are working in sectors, positions or organizations that are connected somehow with their degree program.

For the MAT program, for example, the majority of alumni/ae indicated are working as employed or freelance translators, but an additional sizable number are employed in language-related fields, such as English-language teaching and tourism. Graduates of the PMBA, MBA, Music, Ph.D., BSIT/MSIT, and MAAL programs are all employed in positions connected to their degrees.

It's worth pointing out that for most degree programs, the employment figures from this year's survey of alumni are the same as or slightly better than corresponding figures from the 2013 study (there were no PhD, BM or MSPSY alumni to be surveyed in 2013).

This mix of theoretical presentation The Flight and Aviation Academy and guided experiential learning is very much at the core of the Aviation & Flight Academy. was developed by Dr. Flouris, himself a professional pilot and certified flight and ground instructor who's logged over 6,000 hours of flight time, in collaboration with faculty member Dr. Konstantinos Kalligianis. This summer's course was taught by the Provost himself but one he says he found rewarding. "These are not your average students. are definitely college material."

The University Counseling Center: Alumni services

Meeting professional and life challenges after graduating from University, balancing different roles and responsibilities and coping with personal, family or financial problems can sometimes prove to be complex and difficult, however skilled and resourceful we might be.

The Hellenic American College Counseling Center can provide support in different ways. It can foster insight into our own coping resources, empower self-care strategies, enhance a sense of inner stability and mobilize personal and professional development.

What kinds of problems do we deal with?

Some common problems that our service users report are personal and family difficulties, depression, stress and anxiety, relationship problems, self-esteem issues, life changes and transitions, grief and loss, body image issues, health and sexual health issues, and substance use problems.

What kinds of services can you ask for?

The following services are offered during the academic year; however, as every individual is unique, services are adapted so that each intervention is tailormade to suit your specific needs:

- Professional clinical assessment of your current difficulties
- One to one counseling support: we provide brief counseling (10 sessions) based on Cognitive Behavioral Therapy

- Discussion and professional guidance of other possible ways available to deal with difficulties in addition to counselling
- Group work on specialized topics: last year we ran a group focusing on building "Healthy Relationships"; this year we are running a group focusing on "Positive Parenting Skills". The group usually runs once a year.

We respect the right to privacy of whoever comes to the Center; your personal details and your use of the services are confidential.

Who carries out the counseling services?

We have a team of highly devoted and expertly trained counseling interns at the Center. The interns are in the final year of our Master's program in Psychology/Mental Health Counseling and are especially selected for this role based on their personal maturity, cultural sensitivity and ethical behavior. The counseling interns are regularly and confidentially supervised by expert clinical professionals who are part of the Psychology Department.
